


"In the words of David Bohm, 'The field of the finite is all that we can see, hear, touch, remember and describe.'

This field is basically that which is manifest or tangible. The essential quality of the infinite, by contrast, is its subtlety, its intangibility. The search for the intangible, may we call it God, truth, beauty, love or freedom, is the essence of **Uncharted Seas**.

Though I have separated the pieces, it is actually the entire production viewed in its entirety that tries to capture the essence of 'search'. So, each piece may or may not refer to all our queries.

Some, attempt to transform poetry into images or emotions. Others use abstractions of movement, light, space, rhythm and ambience to evoke images asking the same questions."

About Aditi Mangaldas | Artistic Director, principal dancer and choreographer

Aditi Mangaldas is a leading dancer and choreographer in the classical Indian dance form of Kathak. With extensive training under the leading gurus of Kathak, Shrimati Kumudini Lakhia and Pandit Birju Maharaj, Aditi is today recognised for her artistry, technique, eloquence and characteristic energy that mark every performance. Besides dancing and choreographing classical productions, both solo and group, she has broken new ground by using her knowledge and experience of Kathak as a springboard to evolve a contemporary dance vocabulary, infused with the spirit of the classical.

Considered a maverick in India, Aditi is unafraid to confront social and present-day concerns. Celebrated around the world for the startling richness and intricacy of her dance and choreography, Aditi has recently won the UK Theatre Awards 2024 in the category of 'Achievement in Dance' for MEHEK, a duet with her co-choreographer and dancer Aakash Odedra. Aditi was nominated in the category of 'outstanding performance (classical)' by the National Dance Awards UK - Critics Circle in 2017 for INTER_RUPTED as well as, more recently, for 'outstanding female modern performance' by the National Dance Awards UK - Critics Circle in 2023 for FORBIDDEN, and for the Eastern Eye Arts, Culture, and Theatre Awards 2024 (ACTAs), UK for MEHEK, which was also ranked as 'Top five dance shows of 2024' by The Stage, UK.

Aditi Mangaldas is empanelled with ICCR (Indian Council for Cultural Relations, Government of India) in the 'outstanding artist' category. Aditi was awarded the Gujarat Sangeet Natak Academy award, India 2007 as well as the National Sangeet Natak Akademi award, India 2013, that due to compelling reasons, she declined.


